



Removing Financial Barriers to a Rutgers Education

- **Low or No Tuition Programs:** Bridging the Gap, RU-N to the Top, and Scarlet Guarantee are income-based financial aid programs that help cover in-state tuition and fees and reduce student debt.
- **Scarlet Promise Initiative:** Need-based financial aid and emergency assistance are supported by \$85 million+ in donations given to the university since 2022.
- Rutgers Future Scholars: A national model for success, this precollege program puts academically promising, low-income, first-gen students on a path to earning a college degree, with high school graduation rates as high as 99% and college enrollment rates as high as 88%.





Andrew Krapivin, a 2023 Goldwater Scholar, was named a Churchill Scholar in 2024, the first Rutgers—New Brunswick student in a decade to earn the award funding graduate education at the University of Cambridge in England where he is studying computer science.

Andrea Olavarrieta was one of 10 undergraduates nationwide awarded a 2024 U.S. State Department Foreign Affairs Information Technology Fellowship, supporting her remaining years of baccalaureate study and paving the way for appointment as a Foreign Service diplomatic technology officer.



Truman Scholar

Rutgers—Camden's first Truman Scholar, philosophy major Paul Boyd will receive support for doctoral study leading to a career helping the incarcerated pursue higher education and prepare for life after prison. The award recognizes students who demonstrate outstanding leadership potential, a commitment to a government or nonprofit sector career, and academic excellence.

Environmental engineering major Julianne Chan was named both a 2024 Udall Scholar and Goldwater Scholar and a 2023 NOAA Hollings Scholar for her outstanding achievements as an undergraduate, including collaborating with the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection on a project analyzing the prevalence of microplastics in wastewater.

As a public administration undergraduate at Rutgers– Newark, Aliyah Saleem, class of 2024, founded Hope for Health & Hygiene, envisioning "a future where no one has to choose between food and basic hygiene necessities." Saleem won an inaugural Voyager Scholarship, created by Barack and Michelle Obama and Airbnb CEO Brian Chesky, and now works as a public health adviser.

Top Cancer Care in New Jersey

Rutgers Cancer Institute, New Jersey's only National Cancer Institute-designated Comprehensive Cancer Center, partners with RWJBarnabas Health to provide premier research and patient care. The institute's new home, the Jack and Sheryl Morris Cancer Center, will be the state's first freestanding cancer hospital.

Pathways to Healthy Aging

Unique in the nation, this Rutgers—Newark study of Alzheimer's disease in African Americans has expanded thanks to a \$7.4 million National Institute on Aging grant. Since 2016, the study, led by neuroscientist Mark Gluck, has followed more than 500 Newark-area residents aged 60 and older, exploring risk factors and prevention.



New Jersey's Only Dental School

The Rutgers School of Dental Medicine is the state's largest provider of oral health care, with 137,000 annual patient visits.

Health Care for 9/11 First Responders

The World Trade Center Health Program Clinical Center of Excellence—New Jersey's only WTC health center—provides care at no cost for first responders with health conditions related to the 9/11 terror attacks. Medical director Iris Udasin received the 2024 Federal Law Enforcement Officers Foundation's "Service Above Self" award for her work at the center. WTC health centers are federal programs administered by the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health.

The School of Nursing D.N.P. program is ranked #5 nationally and the M.S.N. program #14 by *U.S. News & World Report*. The B.S.N. ranks in the nation's top 6%. The school is an American Association of Men in Nursing Best School and a national award recipient for diversity and inclusion.

A Great Research University

Rutgers is one of the nation's great research universities, an engine for economic growth, a problem-solver in the short term and for the long haul, and a generator of fresh ideas that open doors to what comes next. Rutgers annually attracts nearly \$1 billion in funding to support innovators across the range of human endeavor. Our research is original, responsive, thought-provoking, and purposeful in a complex world of perpetual and fast-paced change.

Marine biologist David Bushek, director of Rutgers' renowned Haskin Shellfish Laboratory, leads a \$16.7 million Department of Defense-funded project to design and install a reef-mimicking oyster-based shoreline ecosystem to protect the vulnerable Gulf Coast from ravaging storm surge and flooding. Wired says the "prototype artificial reef [is] specifically designed to be colonized by oysters, some of nature's most effective wave-killers."

The internationally acclaimed Center for Ocean Observing Leadership (RUCOOL) is unlocking Earth's undersea secrets. RUCOOL's latest big thing is the world's first circumnavigation of the ocean by a sensor-laden undersea robot that our undergraduate students are leading with

partners around the globe to better understand our ocean planet, shedding light on hurricanes, resilience to natural disasters, and more.

Using Data to Reduce Crime

Using analytics to combat crime, Risk
Terrain Modeling (RTM) is a **proven solution for making communities safer by forecasting high crime areas**. RTM,
developed at the School of Criminal Justice,
uses data and technology to help the
public and police analyze crime patterns,

prioritize responses, and take action. The results are decisive: a 30% reduction in crime.



Making Bridges Safer


The Rutgers Bridge Evaluation and Accelerated Structural Testing facility (BEAST) is the world's only full-scale bridge laboratory that gathers critical data on how extreme weather and heavy traffic weaken a bridge's structural integrity—creating, in just one year, a

decade's worth of real-world wear and tear. Armed with this data, transportation departments can make better informed bridge management decisions, saving billions in infrastructure costs and keeping traffic flowing.


State-of-the-Art Facilities Lead to Discoveries



Amarel Supercomputer: Rutgers' research computing and data analytics system, Amarel performs over 500 trillion mathematical operations per second. Available to all Rutgers researchers, Amarel powers innovation in fields such as disease prediction, galaxy discovery, and sea-level rise projection.



Rutgers University Brain Imaging Center (RUBIC): The state-of-the-art MRI facility enables researchers to conduct studies with advanced technology for eye-tracking and physiological data collection, aural and visual stimulus presentations, and other brain functions. The data increases knowledge of brain processes underlying human development, learning, memory, mental illness, addiction, and more.



Essential Database for Scientific Breakthroughs: Key to medical and biological discovery, the Protein Data Bank (PDB) at Rutgers—New Brunswick is the world's only open-access, 3D digital archive for proteins, DNA, and RNA. PDB structures enabled the 2024 Nobel Prize in Chemistry for computational protein design and protein structure prediction. The National Science Foundation and other federal agencies fund the PDB.

About Rutgers

Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, is a leading national research university and New Jersey's preeminent public institution of higher education. Rutgers' excellence derives from the strength of its academics, research, health care, service, and outreach and from the access and opportunity it provides for the more than 69,000 students who come here to learn and build their futures.

Rutgers' distinctiveness is singular in the United States: It is the nation's sole university that is a major public research university and member of the Association of American Universities (AAU), a land-grant university, and a colonial college founded before the American Revolution. Rutgers' charter was signed in 1766, establishing Rutgers as the nation's 8th oldest higher education institution. In 1864, Rutgers became New Jersey's land-grant university, adding the practical arts and sciences to its mission and positioning its emergence as a modern educational institution and eventual designation in the mid-20th century as The State University of New Jersey, a public institution.

By 1989, Rutgers' stature as a major research institution was recognized with an invitation to join the AAU. In 2013, Rutgers' mission again expanded with the creation of Rutgers Health, a leader in academic health care. In 2014, Rutgers joined both the Big Ten Athletics Conference and Big Ten Academic Alliance, another hallmark of distinction.

Today, Rutgers plays a crucial role in New Jersey, providing a world-class education and serving as an economic engine, job creator, employer, and trusted resource. Rutgers has main campuses in three major New Jersey cities—New Brunswick, Newark, and Camden—and a footprint that spans the state. All three campuses rank among *U.S. News & World Report*'s Top 50 public national universities and Top 100 national universities. Rutgers is one of the only universities in the nation with each campus ranked in the Top 100. At Rutgers, three fundamental values underlie all that we do: offering access and academic excellence, building community, and serving the common good.
